Re: Project Labor Agreement Status Report

The Project Labor Agreement (PLA) for the Transbay Transit Center Program was approved on November 10, 2011. The PLA is designed to ensure labor harmony and equal opportunity for small, local, disadvantaged, union, and non-union businesses throughout construction, providing standardized working conditions and wages. This quarterly report provides information on the status of the administration of the PLA and the apprenticeship plan that was developed in conjunction with the PLA.

PROJECT LABOR/LABOR HARMONY/ ACCESS TO SKILLED LABOR POOL

No work stoppages or labor incidents have affected construction on the project. The Construction Manager/General Contractor Webcor/Obayashi (W/O) and its trade subcontractors have reported no issues accessing skilled labor in sufficient numbers, and each trade subcontractor's workforce demands have been met.

A breakdown of labor by trade and county of residence compiled through June 16, 2016, by Turner Construction, the TJPA's construction management oversight consultant, for the monthly construction update is shown in the two tables that follow:

SAFETY

During the second quarter of 2016, there were three OSHA recordable safety incidents. The three recordable incidents included a Shimmick Construction employee injured his thumb while drilling holes in a steel plate, an Olson Steel employee was hit on the neck by a beam clamp accidentally dropped by another Olson employee and a Best Waterproofing employee who cut his leg requiring stiches. The safety incidents have been reviewed and corrective actions have been put in place.

JOINT ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE

The eighteenth meeting of the Joint Administrative Committee was held on June 16, 2016. Senior Construction Manager, Dennis Turchon, presented the update. A number of key milestones were discussed including:

- Over 2.3 million craft hours have been completed to date, excluding demolition.
- Formwork, rebar and concrete placement for the southwest part of the train box lid continues in the Western Zone.
- Electrical room concrete and concrete masonry unit wall installation is in progress in the Western and Central zones.
- Mechanical, electrical, plumbing and fireproofing trades continue with piping and HVAC duct work at all levels in the Central Zone, with a focus on the lower concourse level.
- Awning, metal panel and curtain wall installation continues in the Central Zone.
- Structural steel welding and bolting punch-list work was completed in the Eastern Zone.
- Eastern Zone concrete pours for the eyebrows and decks continue on all levels.
- Bus Ramp abutment, mechanically stabilized earth wall and retaining wall work continues.

- Bus Ramp Frame 4 stem and soffit concrete placement was completed.
- Bus Ramp falsework erection near Clementina Street including the bus turnaround continues.

Interim Executive Director, Mark Zabaneh, presented the DTX program update, including:

- Review of existing DTX scope and key modifications from the supplemental environmental impact study/report.
- Federal Record of Decision is expected by the end of 2016.
- Review of tunneling options, including cut-and-cover and mined tunnel approaches.
- Current DTX cost estimate including Program contingency, Program Reserve and BART/Muni Pedestrian Connector tunnel.
- Review of DTX funding plan and funding scenarios.

PROGRESS TO DATE – VETERANS

- Webcor/Obayashi (Webcor)
 - Over 40 Webcor employees and family members participated in the Helmets to Hardhats event "Strikeouts for Vets" at the SF Giants game on April 25.
 - Webcor Concrete donated to the Wine Country Marines in support of the Marine Corps Muster and Job Fair on April 9. From this event, three Marines were hired by Webcor and Webcor subcontractors.
 - Future veteran career fairs and hiring events:
 - o July 21, Santa Rosa Hire G.I.
 - o August 9, Los Angeles Hiring Our Heroes
 - o August 19, San Diego Hire G.I.
 - o October 20, Golden Gate University in San Francisco
 - December TBD, Hiring Our Heroes event with the Golden State Warriors
 - Webcor continues to work with United Contractors to place veterans into trade positions on the Transbay project or with other trade contractors.
- ➢ Unions
 - In an effort to be respectful of other union jurisdictions, the local unions within San Francisco will be asking for permission from local unions in adjacent counties to participate in upcoming career fairs within those counties.
 - Plumbers and Pipefitters Local Union No. 38 requested access to the Transit Center jobsite to take photos of its members for an upcoming newsletter. Nila Gonzales agreed to be the onsite point of contact.
 - The unions are continuing to leverage Helmets to Hardhats to spread the word about "direct entry" apprenticeship opportunities.

PROGRESS TO DATE – ADULTS

- > Bill Blackwell, Plumbers and Pipefitters Local Union No. 38:
 - Plumbers and Pipefitters' apprenticeship program totals nearly 500 people, the biggest it has ever been.
 - The most recent apprentice exam was held on Friday, June 10; 1,300 applicants were tested.
 - A new list of apprentice applicants will be started at the end of July to meet the demand.
- > Peter Garza Sr., Carpenters Union Local No. 22:
 - Carpenters continue to maintain over 3,000 apprentices across the 46-county Northern California region.
 - Local 22 has approximately 350 apprentices.
 - Carpenters' apprenticeship enrollment is open throughout the year; the apprenticeship program lasts three to four years.
 - Local 22 has a few new apprentices from John O'Connell High School and has asked Webcor/Obayashi to assist in their placement on local projects.
- ➢ Mike Theriault, SFBCTC:
 - SFBCTC continues to work with SFUSD on an articulation agreement for review by the joint apprenticeship and training committees. The goal is to link the multi-craft core curriculum program with entry into apprenticeship programs.

APPRENTICESHIPS

The TJPA and the unions wish to use the economic activity generated by the design and construction of the Transit Center and related facilities to support meaningful job training. In order to facilitate professional and skilled trade development opportunities for high school students, the economically disadvantaged, and military veterans, as part of the PLA process, the TJPA has developed a plan to promote opportunities for youth and adults, particularly those from disadvantaged backgrounds, and veterans to enter careers in architecture, engineering, construction, and skilled trades.


