TRANSBAY JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY

BRIEF DESCRIPTION

On February 15, 2007, the TJPA Board of Directors approved the appointment of the fifteen inaugural members to the TJPA Citizens Advisory Committee (TJPA CAC). The inaugural CAC meeting was held in April 2007, and the newly appointed members drew lots to determine which would serve initial one-year terms and which would serve full two-year terms. The expiration of subsequent terms has been staggered accordingly. This year, eight regular seats on the committee are open to be filled.

The TJPA CAC bylaws specify that members be selected to represent the following constituent categories:

- 1. Daily Caltrain Rider into San Francisco
- 2. Daily AC Transit Transbay Rider into San Francisco
- 3. Daily MUNI Rider on a line that terminates at or passes through the Transbay Terminal
- 4. Local Resident from District 6
- 5. Local Business from District 6
- 6. Environmentalist
- 7. Member of a Planning or Good-Government Non-Profit Organization
- 8. Representative from Labor
- 9. Bicycle Advocate
- 10. Disabled Advocate
- 11. San Francisco Based Public Transit Advocate
- 12. Regional Transit Advocate
- 13. Regional Transit Advocate
- 14. Member of the Citywide (San Francisco) Business Community
- 15. Member with Expertise in Real Estate Development or Real Estate Finance

The criteria for membership were established to ensure a qualified committee of regional stakeholders with a diverse array of knowledge and interest/advocacy aligned with the principal components that define the Transbay Program. Membership requires affiliation with at least one category, and the bylaws further specify that this mix of representation be preserved when replacement members are appointed to the CAC. The TJPA solicited applications for new and returning members from January 2025 through February 2025. The TJPA received eleven (11) applications, including seven (7) from current members who reapplied.

After reviewing all applications, staff is recommending that the Board of Directors reappoint seven (7) members to the CAC and appoint one (1) new member to fill all eight of the open seats:



Dear Sir/Madam:

Since I moved to the East Bay in 1980, I suspect that there are few who've been stronger advocates than I, both personally and professionally, for extending Caltrain into Downtown San Francisco. I was first exposed to the idea of a DTX in 1983, and as Caltrain's first planning manager, participated in early considerations of routing alternatives, terminal location options and cost/benefit evaluations. I also witnessed shameful undervaluing of the project by regional agencies, hostility from local jurisdictions with priorities (such as building a Giants stadium in a current Caltrain yard) that seemed more pressing, and periodic proclamations of the project's death, even by those who you would expect to be supporters. Luckily these pronouncements were all premature.

Although I'm retired now, I'm gratified that the DTX (or Portal) project has not only not used up the last of its nine lives, but that its prospects for being built within my lifetime appear bright. As a member of the Friends of DTX citizen's organization, I've been privileged to work constructively on the political front to help hasten the day when shovels turn the first dirt indicating that this 40-year-old idea is becoming a reality. Although I've enjoyed giving "atta-boys/girls" to current TJPA staff, your recruitment of Citizens Advisory Committee members affords me the further opportunity of being more than just a cheerleader and a spectator.

Am I qualified to be a committee member? Check my resume. It shows an extensive, career-long professional background in public transportation that I hope is self-explanatory. But this background is supplemented by daily use of the transit product and a long record of community activism. On the application form, you ask applicants to check boxes that make them qualified. I've checked Daily AC Transit Transbay Rider not only because I used to commute that way between Oakland and San Francisco when I worked for Caltrain, but because today, I'm a college student at San Francisco State, and I frequently use AC's OX bus for commuting to and from Alameda. I've also checked the Daily MUNI Rider box, because I use the M line to complete that journey. I checked the environmentalist box, because for six years in the 1980's I was Transportation Chair of the San Francisco Bay Chapter of the Sierra Club. During my tenure, I transformed the committee from a group of hobbyists into advocates for better and more frequent services. We were the first advocates within the Chapter to elevate transit to a legitimate urban environmental issue. Also, although I am no longer a member, I am still the longest serving (at 11 years) past member of the City of Alameda's Transportation Commission, an advisory committee to the city council whose members are appointed by the Mayor. Rather than leave these issues to AC Transit, the city embarked on producing its first Transit plan (and subsequent updates). Although it wasn't in my title, I was considered the transit expert on the commission. As a parent of 40-year-old daughter with Down Syndrome, I have been an activist for equal educational opportunity for the disabled, but also for independent access to local transit services. As a result, I'm proud to boast that my daughter, despite her disability, is an expert user of BART and AC Transit. For the Regional Transit advocate box, I point to my being one of three co-founders of the old Peninsula Rail 2000 (sonamed because we believed, in the 1980's, that the year 2000 was a reasonable time to expect DTX groundbreaking). PR2K has, over the years, morphed into other advocacy groups, but its central idea of turning Caltrain from a commuter railroad into all day-every day rapid transit by purchasing the right-of-way, electrifying the line and, yes, building the Downtown Extension, remains as relevant today, as it was then,


